

All you need to know about the 2023-2024 World Cross- Country Tour



The World Athletics Cross Country Tour kicked off with Silver and Bronze level meetings in Lidingö and Dublin ahead of the Gold series' season-opener on October 22.

The 2023-2024 Cross Country Tour calendar is the biggest yet, as it features 25 fixtures from September to March – 15 Gold level, eight Silver and two Bronze.

The season launched at the TCS Lidingöloppet in Sweden (Silver) on 23 September and continued at the Autumn Open International in Ireland (Bronze) on 15 October.

The NI & Ulster and Bobby Rea International Cross Country in Belfast will welcome athletes for the second Silver meeting of the series on 21 October, the day before the first

Gold level competition at the Cross Internacional Zornotza in Amorebieta-Etxano, Spain.

The Cross Country Tour once again features some of the most prestigious international cross-country races in the world and will form a key part in the preparation of many athletes who will be targeting the World Athletics Cross Country Championships in Belgrade on 30 March.

After the action in Amorebieta-Etxano, the Gold series remains in Spain before stops in the UK, USA, Italy, Belgium, Botswana, Kenya and Portugal.

Sirikwa Classic Cross Country slated for Eldoret on February 3 is the penultimate race of the Gold Tour ahead of the last event – Cross Internacional das Amendoeiras em Flor- programmed for Albufeira, Portugal.

My dream as President of World Athletics was and still is to see the Olympics and Worlds go to Africa!

As a former athlete, and now as head of one of the biggest global sporting federations, I have always extended full support to the idea of the Olympics being staged on various continents

If we are genuinely saying our sport is global, then we have to navigate challenges and circumstances to prove that we are all over the world.

It is really important that we take the Olympics around the world. We can't always assume that the Olympic Games will go to one or two places all the time.

We need to engage our athletes better, and also engage and include newer destinations that want to be part of this process.

But then again, the road will not be easy.

We will need to navigate various circumstances, whether they are political, cultural and sometimes even climatic.

We need to figure out a way to go ahead wherein any city can come forward and host any important event like an Olympics or a World Championships.

I am glad that Kenya and Uganda have already taken the initiative to successfully host the World Cross Country Championships.

I wish to commend Kenya for having staged a successful World Under-20 and Under-18 Championships despite losing their bid to host the 2025 Worlds to Japan.

Granted, Kenya's capacity and integration of all different facets that will give athletes the very best, must be attained.

I'm also glad that Kenyan authorities are yet to throw in the towel and are now keen on hosting the 2029 World Athletics Championships, over and above, the Kip Keino Classic and Sirikwa Classic which have become major fixtures for the East African nation.

Kenyans might have hosted quite successful 2017 World Athletics Under-18 Championships and 2021 World Athletics Under-20 Championships but having a strong technical base will be key to hosting major events.

The World Athletics Council handed Tokyo, that hosted the delayed 2020 Olympic Games in 2021, the rights to host the

2025 World Athletics Championships

The Council sitting in Oregon, United States, also handed the 2024 World Cross Country Championships to Pula and Medulin, Croatia with Florida, United States getting to stage the 2026 World Cross Country Championships.

Nairobi lost out on the 2025 Championships alongside other bidders including Poland and Singapore.

These were four spectacular cities – they all had very different contributions to make and they had very unique assets to boot.

Clearly, one unquestioned asset in Kenya is the love of athletics, the passion for it, and the extraordinary quality of the athletes.

But there were challenges around the national stadium which would have needed a great deal of refurbishment and that was a concern expressed by the World Athletics Council about the timeframe and the quantum of resources that would be needed in order to do that.

Nevertheless, all is not lost.

I visited Kenya and spoke to the Kenyan Athletics Federation and the authorities, and they know that I am fully committed to helping them or any other African country stage a World Championship in the foreseeable future.

One other likely factor in the decision will have been the desire to offer Tokyo an opportunity to stage a major sporting event for its people, who were unable to attend the delayed Olympics and Paralympics staged in their capital city last year because of COVID-19 restrictions.

Using the success of South Africa's 2010 World Cup as a benchmark, one of the best ways to better developing nations using sports is to spread major events around the world and improve the infrastructure and well-being of host nations' fans.

As we pray for a better future for Africa, I take this opportunity to wish all officials, athletes, stakeholders and sponsors a successful Sirikwa Classic in the County of Champions.

Let's enjoy a day laden with entertainment at high altitude.

Demonstrating our commitment to the fight against climate change, Athletics Kenya in 2021 became the first national athletics federation to join World Athletics as a signatory of the United Nations Climate Change (UNCC) Sports for Climate Action Framework, an initiative urging sports organisations to reduce their carbon emissions in line with the Paris Climate Agreement.

The announcement by the nation's athletics governing body came just 10 days after the release of the latest Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report that concluded that some impacts of global warming are now unavoidable and warned that the impacts will worsen dramatically if efforts to curb additional warming fail.

The report, which UN General Secretary Antonio Guterres described as a "code red for humanity", also reiterated that destructive extreme events we're currently witnessing, such as record-breaking heat, floods, cyclones, wildfires and droughts are being made worse by human-induced climate change.

The IPCC report served as a vivid reminder of what is at stake. We are already seeing the devastating impact of climate change in Kenya and elsewhere in Africa.

As we play host to this prestigious Cross country Gold Tour, we must continue demonstrating to the world that we all an important role to play in matters sustainability.

Kenya has a rich tradition in advocating for the environment.

Kenyan Wangari Maathai, founder of the Green Belt Movement that contributed to the planting of more than 30 million trees, was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 2004 for her contribution to sustainable development, democracy and peace, the first African woman to receive the prize. Kenya banned single-use plastics in 2017 and was an early signatory to the Clean Seas initiative.

While the science has shown that some of the impacts are irreversible, it has also shown that we can still prevent the worst of the climate crisis. But we, as leaders in sport, must act now. We must use the influ-



Welcome to the City of Champions



Uasin Gishu County is one of the counties established by the Constitution of Kenya (2010). It is situated in the Rift Valley region of Kenya and covers a total area of 3,345.2 Km². It extends between longitudes 340 50' East and 350 37' East and latitudes 00 03' South and 00 55' North. It borders Trans Nzoia to the North, Elgeyo-Marakwet to the East, Baringo to the South East, Kericho to the South, Nandi to the South West and Kakamega County to the North West. The County headquarters; Eldoret town is approximately 350 Km from Nairobi.

Uasin Gishu County until 1750s was historical a savannah plateau with plenty of wildlife such as Lions, Leopards, Hyenas among others. The Maasai arrived in early 1600 and displaced the Sirikwa people occupied the Plateau and named it as Uasin Gishu after the Illwuasin-Kishu Maasai clan which was a grazing area of the clan. The Nandi displaced Maasai from the Plateau and occupied the Plateau as their grazing areas. Upon the arrival of the British, the Nandis were pushed to the Nandi African reserves while others as laborers in their farms. The plateau then was Anglicized as

Uasin Gishu by the British.

In 1903, the Eldoret area was proposed as a potential Jewish homeland, as the British Uganda Programme. This proposal was rejected by the British Jewish community leaders. In 1908, fifty eight families of Afrikaans-speaking South Africans settled in Uasin Gishu plateau. They were followed by sixty more families in 1911 and more later. The town of Eldoret was established in the

midst of the farms they created

After independence in 1963, the County was administered by the Municipality of Eldoret and the Wareng County Council. In 2010, it was enacted as a one of the 47 devolved Units of Kenya and elected its first Governor, H.E Jackson Kiplagat arap Mandago, EGH in 2013. And in 2022 H.E Hon. Jonathan Bii Chelilim was elected as the second Governor.

World Athletics Sustainability

World Athletics is committed to ensuring that its athletics events, which are held all over the world, and its headquarters, based in Monaco, are fully aligned to the principles of sustainability.

This is in recognition of the growing environmental challenges that the world faces today, specifically air pollution, climate change and our overconsumption of

resources. Those, coupled with a lack of global equality and diversity, create an environmental and social impact that poses a serious threat to the quality of our lives and communities.

Sustainability within athletics is defined as driving the practices and behaviours of all individuals and organisations developing the sport in such a way that it: accounts for the needs of future generations; provides a fair and level sporting platform based on sound ethical principles;

actively involves interested parties and is open about decisions and activities; and ensures actions take a balanced approach to their social, economic and environmental impact.

In April 2020, World Athletics announced its Sustainability Strategy 2020-2030, whose central goal is to make the organisation carbon neutral by 2030.

The ten-year strategy is designed to deliver tangible benefits across the three pillars of sustainability - environmental,



social and economic - by using the power of sport and athletics to create a better world for communities. The strategy includes a broad commitment to embrace sustainability principles and practices within its operations, its Member Federations and the organisation of future World Athletics Series events.

The World Athletics Sustainability Strategy aligns with 13 of the 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals.

The key benefits of the strategy include: better management of the sport's social and environmental risk factors; identification of opportunities benefitting the sport and engaging a wider group of stakeholders; more efficient use of resources delivering lower operating costs enabling greater investment in the sport; and wider activation platform for partnerships to bringing significant economic, social and environmental benefits to local communities.

Components of the Sustainability Strat-

egy include a plan to reduce World Athletics' carbon output by 10 percent each year, a switch to 100 percent renewable energy at its headquarters by the end of 2020, the introduction of a sustainable procurement code and travel policy and to develop best practice guides for its 214 Member Federations and its event organisers.

Known as the cradle of track and field and road running, Uasin Gishu County prides itself on its global sporting prowess.

The “County of Champions” in Kenya was revered for growing its wealth from its ever-rolling high-altitude farm-fields.

But these days, its world-famous long and middle-distance runners have since diverted the county’s wealth into the construction of flats.

With a few days remaining to be named a City, Eldoret town grew up as a city of farmers but now it has been transformed into a city of champions who continue to reap millions of dollars year in year out.

The city of Eldoret, known as the capital of winners, has no qualms about its evergreen production line of world-beater!

From sprints to cross country, these athletes continue to captivate the world stage with verve and vigor and bring home gold, silver and bronze medals year in, year out.

This year alone, Eldoret based-athletes have registered scintillating performances in major cities across the world by winning 60% of the races that came before them.

When the red carpet was rolled out in Bathurst, Australia during the World Cross Country race, the Kenyan team lived up to its billing by winning big and retaining their world title.


The irony is that Eldoret was blamed for giving their position by retaining the title as most of the medal winners were from Eldoret.

While people from other countries are trying to be seen as Kenyans, Kenyans themselves don’t even have a chance to wear those uniforms.

While you are in Eldoret, you will not be shocked to see skyscrapers bearing names of big cities in the world; such as Johannesburg plaza, Grandpri (from grand prix), Kamariy House, Kiremi Arcade, Komora Centre among others.

Most of the names of these cities indicate places where some of the athletes participated and won millions that they used to build these flats.

That Eldoret athletes have put Kenya on the world map, goes without saying. 

He was born in Kapsisiywa, Nandi County, where Kipchoge hails from and after completing his secondary education, he was lucky to land a scholarship to study in the United States of America where he joined Iowa State University and the University of Texas while sharpening his athletics skills.

Janeth Jepkosgei

(Eldoret Express)

Janeth, nicknamed "Eldoret Express" hails from the Kenyan village of Kabirirsang, near Kapsabet. Famous athletes Wilson Kipketer and Wilfred Bungei are also from the same village.. Janeth started athletics while at Kapsumbeiywo Primary School and took several events.

Janeth is a prominent name in Kenyan athletics and she etched her legacy in the history of middle-distance running with a groundbreaking victory at the 2007 Osaka World Championships.

Born on December 13, 1983, in Nandi District, Kenya, Jepkosgei rose to prominence as the first Kenyan female athlete to secure the gold medal in the fiercely competitive 800m race during the Osaka World Championships.

Jepkosgei's triumph in the 800m race not only marked a significant personal achievement but also shattered stereotypes, showcasing Kenya's prowess beyond the traditionally dominant long-distance events.

Just like the Mozambican legend Maria Mutola who was nicknamed "The Maputo Express" for her track antics, Eldoret Express' exceptional speed, endurance, and strategic racing tactics propelled her to the pinnacle of middle-distance running, earning her a place among the elite athletes of her generation.

The historic nature of Janeth's victory in Osaka serves as a testament to her dedication to the sport and her role in breaking new ground for Kenyan female athletes.

Her success reverberates through the annals of athletics, inspiring future generations and contributing to the evolving narrative of Kenya's prowess in a diverse range of track and field disciplines.
